



GGC GENERAL MEETING & HOLIDAY DESIGN WORKSHOP



GGC President Becky O'Brien presented an overview of the club's coming activities.



A majestic old live oak on the far end of our parking area was irreparably damaged in a 2022 storm. When it was removed, Horticulture Chair Kathy Fanning suggested sowing native wildflower seeds around the gigantic tree trunk. With the Board's approval, she initially sowed four species of wildflowers: (*Coreopsis* Black eyed Susans and blanket flowers)

The next spring, a mass of yellow mostly *Coreopsis leavenworthii* and *Coreopsis lanceolata* graced the area.



Through 2023 and 2024, Kathy added more seeds or transplants of at least a dozen additional species. This past year, after several dry Spring months, black-eyed Susans—hundreds, maybe thousands – dominated the area for several months. (Black-eyed Susans *Rudbeckia hirta*) prefer dry conditions).





During the meeting attendees will select the "Popular Choice Award" from the first-place winning photographs.

COMPETITION GUIDELINES:

1. Competition is open exclusively to District V members who are amateur photographers.
2. Photos will be accepted beginning March 1, 2026, through March 31, 2026.
3. There will be NO fees for photo entries.
4. Members are allowed to enter one photo in up to five categories.
5. All photos must be taken in Florida.
6. Photographs taken in enclosed exhibits or with people in them will not be accepted.
7. Members who won a 1 set Place Award last year are not eligible to enter a photograph in the same category but may enter other categories.
8. Awards will be given as follows: First Place, Second Place, and Third Place. Honorable Mentions will be awarded when judges feel photographs merit it.
9. By entering the contest, photographers grant permission to District V to use their images online and in print for non-commercial purposes. The photographer retains all rights to their photos and may use them in any way they choose.

All entries must include the following information:

- Category
- Title of your photo and the location of where the photo was taken.
- Your name and garden club/circle
- Your email address and phone number
- Save your photo as follows: category, garden club, your last name

CATEGORIES INCLUDE:

1. Butterflies: caterpillars, chrysalis or butterfly
2. Birds: birds flying, in trees, birdbaths, bird houses, bird feeders, etc.
3. Flowers: (No still life photos)
4. Insects: bees, ants, dragonflies, bugs, beetles, etc.
5. Reptiles: lizards, snakes, turtles, alligators, etc.
6. Wildlife: deer, squirrels, bats, otters, opossum, foxes, etc. (No pets or livestock)
7. Garden Accents: solar lights, swirly whirly rotating spinning decorations, yard art, statutes, gnomes, steppingstones, fountains, ponds etc.

MONETARY AWARDS:

An award of \$25 will be given for photos in the following areas:

- "Best-in-Show Award" – judged by the judging panel
- "Most Unique & Creative Award" – has a WOW factor – judged by the judging panel
- "Popular Choice Award" – voted on by attendees at the Spring District V Meeting.

Photographs will be judged on: good composition, representative of category, color, print quality, creativity & uniqueness.


