Rentals Committee Update

The impacts of Covid-19 have been significant on the rentals program. As a venue that serves the public by renting our facilities to the community, we follow the guidelines set forth by the City and County regarding social gatherings. These guidelines limit our ability to rent to any group greater than 50 people. As a result, we have had to cancel some existing bookings or have gained agreement to reschedule other rentals to a future date. In the current environment, we cannot accept any new bookings that exceed the 50 person limit and this has significantly decreased the rentals of our buildings. We are confident that, as restrictions ease, our rentals program will be in demand again. We are already seeing more activity in October and are hopeful that this trend may continue.

Following a detailed analysis of pricing at other local venues, a rental fee increase was proposed to the Board of Directors. The increase in fees will improve future revenue streams while still remaining highly competitive in the Gainesville market. The Board approved the rental increase which went into effect September 1, 2020.

Horticulture

A few updates and news on the GGC horticulture scene....

Kathy Fanning, Chair

- 1. As many of you know GGC has been involved in wildflower projects for many years and this time of year we are right around the corner from the best time to sow wildflower seeds. Some of us on the horticulture committee are again working with Alachua County Public Works (PW) to plan for two roadway median seedings in early November. One is a small median on NW43rd Street and the other is a reworking of our previous NW 16th Avenue wildflower seeding. We have very recently gotten assurances that PW will be able to do the necessary site preparation work which is so critical for successful seed germination and establishment. We are planning to use a wildflower seed mix that can provide color through several seasons. As we get closer to seeding time we will be asking for more help, so let me know if you would like to volunteer!
- 2. Another related new initiative in our community is the work the Sierra Club is spearheading by making an application for Gainesville to receive the Bee City USA designation. This designation is not just to promote bees but also other pollinators and especially plants that support these pollinators. The intent is to increase pollinator friendly plantings for all pollinators and increase pollinator friendly plants in cities and counties all over the country. If this application is approved, there will be many ways GGC can partner with this initiative for the benefit of both organizations and the community.
- 3. And lastly, in late October there are plans for a garden tour or two (hopefully) in the southwest area of the county. It should be more pleasant weather so keep looking for an announcement with further details soon.

Stay safe and happy gardening! Hopefully the weeds will start to slow down soon with some cooler weather!!

Your Garden Calendar

Thanks to our friends at IFAS, you can keep up with WHAT TO PLANT and WHAT TO DO in your Florida garden for every month of the year. Here is a snapshot for you that covers October-December.

WHAT TO PLANT

November Pansy, viola, chrysanthemum Amaryllis, crinum, daylily Cilantro, parsley, thyme Broccoli, cabbage, kale, lettuce Camelias, Taiwan Cherry

December Snapdragon, alyssum, lobelia Amaryllis Garlic, comfrey

October

Camelias

October

Daffodil

Petunia, shasta daisy, foxglove

Onions, lettuce, spinach, arugula

Sage, dill, fennel, oregano

Lawns – Apply preemergent herbicides to lawns when nighttime temperatures are 55-60 degrees F; Overseed with annual ryegrass for a green winter lawn when daytime temperatures are in the low 70s

Landscaping – Plant evergreen hollies **Pine needles** – Gather and use for natural mulch

Strawberries – This is the last month to set strawberry plants in the garden or in large containers

Camelias – Fertilize new plantings with 0-0-22

Pruning/Deadheading – Take off dead blooms and seeds to encourage new flowers

WHAT TO DO

November

Citrus – Protect from freezing temps by watering well at least a day before the freeze

Scale Insects – Apply dormant oil sprays to control insects on trees and shrubs

Irrigation – Turn off systems; plants need less supplemental water in cooler weather

Flowering Trees – Debud or remove some buds from camelias to stimulate larger blooms later

Birds – Make a small brush pile from plant debris in your backyard for birds **Pruning/Deadheading** – Take off dead blooms and seeds to encourage new flowers

December

Cold Damage – Wait until warm weather returns to cut back colddamaged plants

Soil – Perform a soil test if plants are not performing as desired of if new plantings are planned

Compost/Mulch – Use fallen leaves to boost compost piles or as mulch to protect plant roots

Pruning/Deadheading – Take off dead blooms and seeds to encourage new flowers

A Look Back in Time

1946 – The FFGC sponsored a Forest Conservation Bill introduced in the State Legislature pertaining to fire prevention and reforestation.

1947-49 - Mrs. Fred Borland was president and the garden club requested the city planner to form a "Keep Florida Green" conference at which time "Seeds for Peace" movement began. The Garden Club helped organize a garden club in Newberry. GGC planted 12 live oak trees on the Court House Square. The Geranium Circle was organized for businesswomen.

1949-50 –Mrs. G. Kirkpatrick was president. Rootings were given to families living in Flavet III and the club beautified the intersection of 9th Street and Archer road. The District 3 meeting was held in Gainesville. A 25th Anniversary tea was held at the home of Mrs. J. Oneal Cox.

1950-52 – Mrs. James Day was president when the club decided to cooperate with the Men's Garden Club in creating a camellia garden to honor the late Mr. Roy Wilmot. "Flowers for Peace" was the theme of the flower show. Two hundred fifty pine seedlings were planted at city schools for Arbor Day.

The Language of Butterflies



How Thieves, Hoarders, Scientists, and other Obsessives

Unlocked the Secrets of the World's Favorite Insect

Book Review by Linda Schoellhorn

This was a fascinating and very entertaining book all about the history of butterflies all the way up to current knowledge about butterflies. If that sounds boring, think again! Ms. Williams is such a great storyteller adding humor and human interest that I found it hard to put the book down. For



example, we learn that in the 1600's a young woman discovered the relationship between butterflies and caterpillars – prior to that time they were thought to be different species and one was angelic and one was evil! Several women are featured as being early scientists in their male dominated world in discoveries about butterflies. Ms. Williams also traveled to many locations around the world, and I found myself using satellite maps on the internet to take a closer look. Her writing made me want to explore even more. "The world's favorite insect," she writes, "unites us across generations and across space and across time. They are elemental. A butterfly is an entire universe, right there in the palm of your hand." Kirkus reviews sum it up by saying "A merry jaunt through the past, present, and future of butterfly pop science." I couldn't agree more! This is not a big book and it is very easy to read and enjoy!


