Gold Star Event

In May 2015, with the approval of the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Gold Star Families

Memorial Marker was added as an adjunct program to the Blue Star Memorial Marker Program which began as a National Garden Clubs, Inc. initiative in 1947.

There are 39 NGC Gold Star Families Memorial Markers throughout the United States. The Gainesville Garden Club will have the 1st Marker of this type and size in the State. There is a smaller NGC Gold Star Families By Way Marker in the Palm Beaches Area.

THE TRIBUTE LINE ON THE GOLD STAR FAMILIES MEMORIAL MARKER IS: "A tribute to Gold Star Families whose loved one paid the ultimate price defending the United States of America."

The name Gold Star came from the custom of families of servicemen hanging a banner called a service flag in the window of their homes. The service flag had a star for each family member in the United States Armed Forces. Living servicemen were represented by a Blue Star, and those who had lost their lives were represented by a Gold Star.

Gold Star Families is a 501(c) (3) not for profit organization created to provide support to those who have lost a loved one in service to our country through the United States Armed Forces. All family members representing all conflicts, all branches of service and all circumstances of death are supported.

Building and Grounds

The BOT met on May 29, 2018. The following was reported as completed or was approved to be done:

- Inside ladies restroom, replace AC unit and light. Kathy Stephens painted the vanity table, mirror and lights, and replaced the chair.
- Pressure washing all concrete: Chris Patrick completed August 26. \$400
- Roof and gutter cleaning completed-Handyman Extraordinaire-Rick-\$450
- Roof Repaired over storage room and stained glass stepping stones leveled to sidewalk height-Handyman Extraordinaire-\$120
- LCB Ceiling plaster scheduled for Monday, Sept. 24 and painting scheduled for Thurs. Sept 27-Southern Comfort Home, \$1,397.50. Southern Comfort Home met all needs of plaster, paint and cleaning. They are certified building contractor, licensed and insured.
- Approve building of a storage room addition for approximately \$30,000, with half to paid from GGC funds and half to be requested as donations from members. Permitting and design in process.

The following was approved via an e-poll of trustees:

- Removal and cleanup of fallen oak tree & damaged sweet gum tree – award-

ed low bid to Conrad Irving for \$3,900, work to be completed by Sept 20, 2018.

The following will be addressed at the Sept 18, 2018 meeting:

- Bid to Clean Windows: Southern Comfort Home-\$325 for all outdoor. Handyman Extraordinaire referral-\$550 for inside/out and \$275 just outside. Not insured.
- Discuss Gutter from courtyard left side to area behind LCB.
- Hose in front drive - need nozzle for hose to water planters at front walkway.
- Follow up on Florence's tree in front camellia bed which died. Bruce to remove in October. Lynnette to follow up on purchase of new tree and installation. Make decision on tree species.
- Kitchen - replace door in the left side of kitchen to match the right side (put in 3 years ago). We have hardware in hallway cabinet which was donated.
- Ladies Bathroom - New toilet seat in right side; new handle in stainless for inside pull type door. Stage door has the pull we need to match; kick plate and hand plate in stainless needed.
- Main building – Chandelier - look at options to remove as needed and wire so has a switch when hanging.
- Main building - new blinds
- Outdoors - Water buildup in circular driveway may need to pipe it into the center.
- Driveways need to be repaired where black top is erupting. Is this part of the street? Would County be responsible?

Opportunities abound for Garden Club members and their guests!

On September 27th, Dalia Hobbs will host GGC members, giving us the chance to see her signature plants: many varieties of dahlias. If you've lived in more northern parts of the U.S., you know that dahlias are the stars of late summer gardens. However, they are somewhat tricky here in north central Florida. But Dalia has mastered this species! Visit her garden, be amazed and learn what it takes to grow these beauties.



On October 25th, we will have the chance to visit two gardens: those of neighbors Mary Schindler and Becky O'Brien. About three years ago Mary started buying plants for the shady edge of the woods in her backyard. Then she had a stone staircase built to access the garden.

About a year ago, she started to clear the woods to make room for more shade plants. Now she has a collection of over a dozen varieties of ferns, ground covers, and shade plants spilling over the hillside and into the woods behind her house.

Mary's front yard features a succulent garden near the front entrance. The beautiful expanse of lawn in no way hints at the picturesque space behind the house, where Mary has turned a nondescript wooded area into a stunning shade garden.


Becky O'Brien lives next door to Mary. Becky describes her yard as "A pine shaded acre featuring a large sculpture in the back yard, where she and her husband Dave have worked to create a garden along a slope to solve a mowing issue." By late October, the pyracantha and tangerines should be adding orange to the scene. Becky has a flair for color combinations. Her front yard combines unusual shrubs, camellias and her prized tabebuia tree. Maybe she'll invite us back when in the spring it's in bloom?

Peggy Martin and the Story of Her Rose

Peggy Martin, of Plaquemines Parish, LA, was an accomplished gardener and a rose lover; this rosarian had a collection of over 450 roses that she grew with organic methods in her rich alluvial soil. One of her favorites was an unnamed pink rose that she had received in 1989 from a friend in New Orleans who had gotten it from a relative. This pass-a-long plant was a thornless Old Garden rose that had prompted Peggy's interest in these old roses.

Peggy and her businessman husband lived near her parents close to the Gulf of Mexico on a strip of land between two levees that kept the Mississippi River at bay. When Katrina was approaching in 2005, her parents could not be persuaded to leave. The levees held, but the 30 foot storm surge from the hurricane filled up the space between the two levees like a bathtub. Tragically, her parents' bodies were found floating in the muddy water two days after Katrina passed through. Bulldozers broke through to release the brackish waters two weeks afterwards. When Peggy and her husband returned to their home site in the third week, they found that a huge oak had fallen on their house; a few pieces of china were all they could salvage; her husband's shrimp boat was demolished and the vehicles in his shed were inoperable. But then she saw a bit of green coming through the sludge beside the shed: it was the nameless pink rose. Subsequently, Peggy and her husband sold that property and moved to the Baton Rouge area; you can be sure she took cuttings of the rose and started new ones.



When her friend, Dr. Bill Welch, a professor at Texas A and M University, read about the rose, he came up with the idea of getting different rose growers to propagate the rose and name it the 'Peggy Martin' rose. The growers agreed to give \$1 of the price for each rose sold to a fund to restore gardens in the area affected by Hurricane Katrina. Peggy Martin herself continues to serve on the Board of the Heritage Rose Foundation. The rose named for her has been cloned over and over; thus, this rambler continues to spread its beauty. May you be so lucky as to have one growing in your garden.
