Short Course Highlights

- On a walk near the lodge, the rangers explained the difference between a long leaf pine and a slash pine. We were informed that today's pines are harvested for wood and paper pulp, but historically, pines were tapped for resins and most importantly turpentine.
- Fish expert, Dr. Chuch Cichra, instructed attendees on how invasive plants in the waterways are detrimental to fish.
- Bluebirds: No, you can't get bluebirds to sit on your shoulder, but Mary Miller, the Audubon Society member who tends to the Flatwoods Park Bluebird Trail near Tampa with its 51 bluebird boxes, assured us we can have successful bluebird nesting in our yard if we understand their needs:

A nesting box with the following specs:

Location at the edge of an open grassy area; ideally next to trees or bushes for cover Facing east or north (south and west make the nest box too hot for baby birds) A 1 ¹/₂ " opening; A baffle to keep out predators (especially snakes); A 3-4" overhang; No perch! (Predator birds will use it.)
