Although everyone has been affected by COVID, we are very proud of the many accomplishments our clubs were able to achieve, despite the virus. Our theme of: "Plant America, Nurture the Garden We Call Georgia" is alive and well. It was a pleasure to see so many clubs apply for and win

awards - announcements for State Awards and DS will be made mid-April. We will need to wait a bit for NGC results. Naturally, we are disappointed that all our club members cannot celebrate together at the spring convention. Never did we expect these cancellations to last this long. However, business matters have been dealt with efficiently. We have held GCG State Board Meetings via ZOOM and all major committees have held virtual meetings. All the Districts either met in person outside or held virtual meetings. Officers have been elected and we are happy to announce that we will be able to host a Board Appreciation and Installation of Officers in person on April 21st for our GCG State Officers and the 7 District Directors. We located a country club that could accommodate our large group and still adhere to the CDC Guidelines.

We have a close partnership with the State Botanic Garden at the University of Georgia-Athens. Members from our 7 Districts, as well as myself as GCG President, serve as representatives on the "Friends of the Garden" Exec. Board. We co-sponsor the annual Native Plant Symposium, which was held virtually in early February - this year's topic was the Monarch Butterfly. We promote other events as well - on Feb 2nd & 3rd Professor Doug Tallamy spoke about his newest book "Nature's Best Hope" via Zoom presented by both the State Botanic Garden and the Cherokee Garden Library in Atlanta. Our members could choose from two viewing dates or view a recorded presentation if they did not see him live.

The big announcement at the State Botanic Garden was the opening of the Porcelain and Decorative Arts Museum at the Center for Art and Nature. Deen Day Sanders donated funds for the building which now houses her beautiful collection of porcelain pieces and

sculptures depicting flora and fauna. It is a must see for all our members. The grand opening of course had to be cancelled due to the virus, but smaller groups are now touring. GCG started a fund several years ago to honor the memory of Deen's son who passed away due to MS. There is now a handicapped accessible walkway from the parking lot at the Garden leading to "Deen's Museum" which is being landscaped with the funds donated by garden club members and dedicated as the C. Burke Day Memorial Walkway. We hope to have a celebration party in the Fall.

The other project of cooperation was the "Plant to Connect" program at the Garden, promoting native plants in community gardens. This was a special project of ours in GCG, encouraging members to use native plants, not only in their personal landscapes, but to urge city/town/churches to incorporate natives in community settings and have those areas registered with the Garden.

Over the past year, we encouraged all our clubs to think outside the box and share ideas about how to stay in touch even though clubs were not meeting in person as per normal. Our Club President's Report gave extra credit for any "COVID Activity": a particular activity, something not normally done, in order for club members to meet safely or stay connected during this challenging year. They elaborated on a separate sheet and it was inspiring to see what all was accomplished in small groups or remotely. Now that spring is upon us, more clubs are planning on meeting again - many outside in pavilions.

Scholarships are always a high priority in Georgia. Last year we awarded \$71,000 in scholarships to Georgia college students in garden related fields. This Spring/Summer we expect to award \$70,000. Generous donations for 'Named Scholarships' are appreciated.

Despite Covid we had a number of new clubs formed using our new "Mentoring" new clubs program and grant. Existing clubs can apply for a grant to offset the cost of program supplies when they are mentoring new clubs and helping them get started. We hope this will be even better after the virus is under control.

Georgia has seen many Blue Star Marker Dedications in recent months, with many more on the horizon, postponed from 2020. Also, many of our clubs have taken advantage of the 50/50 grant GCG offers for

restoration of older BSMs that needed repair. This grant is funded with annual donations from many clubs. We give 'credit' on the Club President's Report for donations to our list of good causes. Donations will probably be somewhat less this year because of the virus, but many clubs have still managed to maintain a good balance sheet and continue to donate generously.

We continue to promote grants in the areas of Historic Landscape Preservation, Community on My Mind beautification projects, Garden Therapy and more. Our Historic Landscape Preservation Fundraiser was rescheduled from this Spring to Oct. 2021, and we look forward to great attendance at Hills and Dales in LaGrange.

All seven of our Districts will be holding Leadership/Awards Workshops over the summer as well as District Board Meetings in August. Everyone is anxious to get back to normal.

The formation of New Garden Clubs will resume as a focus for the future, as well as our returning projects for Native Plants and Pollinator Gardens.

We had great plans. Many of those plans were placed on hold. The goal of installing Blue Star Markers at the Louisiana Welcome Centers started successfully in January 2020 at the I-10 Welcome Center in Slidell. I am happy to report that a Blue Star Memorial Marker has been ordered for the I-10 Vinton Welcome Center. We

hope to be able to install it in April 2021. A Gold Star Memorial Marker will be dedicated in May by the Terrebonne Garden Club in Houma.

“Bring Nature Home with Native Plants” is still good advice. After multiple hurricanes and snow and ice, the native plants are surviving better than the non-natives. It’s never too late to add them to your landscape.

The business of the Federation continued through emails, postal mail, phone calls, conference calls, Zoom meetings and a few in-person meetings. The most recent meeting was the Winter Executive Council Meeting on February 23. Because the 2021 Convention will not be held, a decision was made about the method of voting by the Board of Directors. Ballots were due on March 29. The results will be announced later this month. The current Native Plant List will be replaced by the Louisiana Native Plant Society’s Louisiana Certified Native Plant List. Future Convention sites are: 2022—Baton Rouge; 2023—Vidalia; and 2024—Lake Charles.

Instead of an installation, Roxanna and I will meet at the end of April to transfer the President’s files, the President’s pin and gavel, and all that goes with the office. We hope to have photos of the occasion to post. Other 2019-2021 officers and chairmen should make plans to transfer materials to their successors. The 2021-2023 administration will begin their duties on May 1. I extend my best wishes and support to them.

Serving as LGCF President is a great honor and privilege. After sending off the NGC State Garden Club Report for the history of this administration in January, here are some of the history highlights for Tennessee:

1. This president held electronic board meetings in 2019 and 2020 with motion ballot votes all done by email. It was a great success for the board and members to continue the business of TFGC.

2. The TFGC President Special Project "Grow with Communication and Education" requested four district Floral Design Chairmen to present floral design workshops each year. The chairmen selected the date, location and designs. All held in 2019 and part of 2020 until the COVID-19 cancelled any workshops after September 2020.

3. The TFGC Awards Chairman presented Award Workshops to the four districts in 2019-2020. A slide presentation showed the members how to enter a book of evidence. This chairman created an Awards Manual with all the TFGC, DSGC and NGC awards and rules and distributed it to the District Directors.

4. After seven years of creation, the TFGC Native Plant Book committee published the "Native Plants of Tennessee" book. TFGC sold over 400 copies to the members and the general public.

5. All TFGC documents: Bylaws, Standing Rules, Officers Duties and Chairmen Job Descriptions were updated by the TFGC President and placed on the website for the 2021 administration.

6. TFGC received seven first place and five youth awards from DSGC in 2019.

By the time the DSGC Matters newsletter is published, this president and treasurer will be closing the books for 2019-2021 and preparing to install the next president in April 2021. Although the state presidents missed out on conventions, meetings and all the fanfare of being a president, I am pleased with all the communication and education given to the TFGC members!

By Laws

Deep South Garden Clubs, Inc.

Dear Deep South Garden Club Board Members:

As we all know this has not been a normal Garden Club year. Because of Covid, many meetings, events and our State and Deep South Conventions could not be held. At the 2019 DSGC Convention a DSGC Bylaws Committee was appointed to review the DSGC Bylaws. For legal purposes the Bylaws were adopted in 2018 exactly as they had been filed with the Articles of Incorporation.

The committee found several minor changes that needed to be made for clarification and simplification. On the advice of Joan Corbisciero, NGC Parliamentarian, the following statement was added to the Bylaws regarding the use of the titles President/Vice President and Director/Alternate Director:

In these Bylaws, the President and Vice President of the Corporation shall hereinafter be known and referred to as the Region Director and the Alternate Director respectively.

At the time of incorporation as DSGC the lawyer advised that the titles of President and Vice President be used in the original set of Bylaws. It has been the policy of NGC and DSGC to use the terms Director and Alternate Director to designate those officers. The NGC Parliamentarian ruled that this was a "housekeeping" action and did not require a formal vote as it was only cleaning up the language for clarity.

The Bylaws Committee has reviewed the original Bylaws and Policies and has proposed several changes. Since DSGC Bylaws have no provisions for voting by the Board of Directors when a convention is not held, we will follow the NGC Bylaws ARTICLES XI and XXII which state:

In the event a National emergency prevents elections [Bylaws amendments] held at a NGC Convention, elections [Bylaw amendments] may be held by mail.

1. Ballots shall be sent by electronic device or postal mail, to the Board of Directors...

2. All ballots must be received by the recording Secretary within 30 days by postal mail to be counted.

3.these Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote by mail ballot following the procedures

outlined in ARTICLE XI.

Attached to this letter is a copy of the PROPOSED CHANGES TO DSGC BYLAWS 2021 and a DSGC BOARD OF DIRECTORS MAIL BALLOT FOR PROPOSED CHANGES TO DSGC BYLAWS AND POLICIES 2021.

After careful study of the worksheet of PROPOSED CHANGES, please mark your DSGC MAIL BALLOT and mail to the DS Recording Secretary by April 21, 2021 for your vote to be counted. If you have any questions you may contact Mary Sue Colvin, DSGC Bylaws Committee Chairman at mscolvin2@gmail.com.

Note: A two-thirds majority of the ballots received shall determine the results.

3. To further horticultural education, conservation and scholarship funds to State Universities.

Proposed Changes:

Strike: “conservation and”

Add: “...environmental concerns, and landscape design through...”

Will Read as Follows:

3. To further horticultural education, environmental concerns and landscape design through scholarship funds to State Universities.

ARTICLE III – OFFICERS, ELIGIBILITY, NOMINATION, ELECTION Section 2. Eligibility

Currently Reads:

A. The offices of Director and Alternate Director shall be permanently rotated among the DSGC states...

Proposed Changes:

Strike the word “permanently”

Will Read as Follows:

A. The offices of Director and Alternate Director shall be rotated among the DSGC states as follows: Louisiana, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi, Tennessee and Alabama.

Currently Reads:

B. Each State Garden Club shall endeavor to comply with the permanent rotation.

Proposed Changes:

Strike the word “permanent”

Will Read as Follows:

B. Each State Garden Club shall endeavor to comply with the rotation.

Currently Reads:

To be eligible for the office of Director and for the office of Alternate Director, one must:

2) Attended two (2) of three (3) previous DSGC Conventions at the time of election.

Proposed Changes:

Strike #2 and replace to read as follows...

Will Read as Follows:

(2) Have attended a minimum of two DSGC Conventions and may include the DSGC Convention when installed.

Currently Reads:

(4) The Director and Alternate Director shall assume their duties of office for a two-year term at the close of the DSGC Convention in the odd-numbered year.

Proposed Changes:

Add: "...or until their successors are elected."

Will Read as Follows:

(4) The Director and Alternate Director shall assume their duties of office for a two-year term at the close of the DSGC Convention in the odd-numbered year or until their successors are elected.

Currently Reads:

To be eligible for the office of Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Historian and Chairman of Finance, a member must:

1) Have served on the Board of Directors and attended two out of the last three Annual Conventions of the DSGC.

Proposed Changes:

Strike #1 and replace to read as follows:

Will Read as Follows:

(1) Have served on the DSGC Board of Directors and shall have attended a minimum of two DSGC Conventions and may include the DSGC Convention when installed.

Currently Reads:

Section 3. – Nomination

B. The Nominating Committee consisting of one member and one alternate from each state shall be elected at the Annual state Convention in the off year preceding the election- year convention...

Proposed Changes:

Add: "DSGC".

Strike "off year preceding the election year" and replace with "even-numbered year" to read as follows:'

Will Read as Follows:

B. The DSGC Nominating Committee of one member and one alternate from each state shall be elected at the Annual State Convention in the even-numbered year.

Currently Reads:

D. The report of the Nominating Committee shall appear in the DSGC Publication, Deep South Matters and on the DSGC website immediately preceding the election-year convention.

Proposed Changes:

Add: "...and shall include a candidate for the offices of Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Chairman of Finance..."

Strike: "appear". Add: "...be included in the Convention Call letter, in the DSGC publication Deep South Matters and on the DSGC website..."

Will Read as Follows:

D. The report on the Nominating Committee shall include a candidate for the offices of Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Chairman of Finance and shall be included in the Convention Call letter, in the DSGC publication, Deep South Matters, and on the DSGC website immediately preceding the election-year convention.

ARTICLE IV – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Director

Currently Reads:

H. Sign contracts for DSGC meetings.

Proposed Changes:

Add: "...or provide written authorization for the President of the state hosting the event to sign contracts."

Will Read as Follows:

H. Sign contracts for DSGC meetings or provide written authorization for the President of the state hosting the event to sign contracts.

ARTICLE VI – BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 2. Meetings

Currently Reads:

A. The DSGC Board of Directors shall meet annually prior to the DSGC Convention.

Proposed Changes:

Add: "E. In the event a DSGC Convention is not held, items that require the vote of the Board of Directors at the annual convention may be voted on by mail (Budget, Election of Officers, etc.)

1. Ballots shall be sent by electronic device or postal mail to the Board of Directors by the Region Director.
2. All ballots must be received by the Recording Secretary within 30 days by postal mail to be counted.
3. A plurality of the ballots returned shall determine the results."

Will Read as Follows:

E. In the event a DSGC Convention is not held, items that require the vote of the Board of Directors at the annual convention may be voted on by mail (Budget, Election of Officers, etc.)

- 1. Ballots shall be sent by electronic device or postal mail to the Board of Directors by the Region Director.**

- 3. A plurality of the ballots returned shall determine the results.**

ARTICLE IX – CONVENTIONS

Section 2. Finances

Currently Reads:

A. The Director will sign the Convention Hotel contract.

Proposed Changes:

Add: "or provide written authorization for the President of the state hosting the event to sign the contract."

Will Read as Follows:

A. The Director will sign the Convention Hotel contract or provide written authorization for the President of the state hosting the event to sign the contract.

ARTICLE XII – AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

Currently Reads:

The Bylaws may be amended at the DSGC Convention by a two-thirds vote, provided that the amendment has been attached to the CALL to the DSGC Convention or submitted at least fifteen (15) days prior to the DSGC Convention. With a unanimous vote, these Bylaws may be amended at the DSGC Convention without previous notice.

Proposed Changes:

Label current section of Article as "A."

Add: "B. In the event a DSGC Convention cannot be held, these Bylaws may be amended by ballots sent by electronic device or postal mail to the Board of Directors by the DSGC Director. All ballots are to be received by the Recording Secretary within thirty days by postal mail to be counted. A two-thirds majority of the ballots received shall determine the results."

Will Read as Follows:

A. The Bylaws may be amended at the DSGC Convention by a two-thirds vote, provided that the amendment has been attached to the CALL to the DSGC Convention or submitted at least fifteen (15) days prior to the DSGC Convention. With a unanimous vote, these Bylaws may be amended at the DSGC Convention without previous notice.

B. In the event a DSGC Convention cannot be held, these Bylaws may be amended by ballots sent by electronic device or postal mail to the Board of Directors by the DSGC Director. All ballots are to be received by the Recording Secretary within thirty days by postal mail to be counted. A two-thirds majority of the ballots received shall determine the results.

Strike dates and "and one alternate from each state".

Add: "from each of two DS states" and list states in order of rotation.

Add: "In the event a state must decline its turn in the rotation, the next state in the rotation will provide a member and alternate for the NGC Nominating Committee."

Will Read as Follows:

VII. The order of rotation for the DSGC representatives, one member from each of two DS states in the rotation to serve on the NGC Nominating Committee shall be as follows:

Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama

In the event a state must decline its turn in the rotation, the next state in the rotation will provide a member for the NGC Nominating Committee.
