HOMOSASSA RIVER GARDEN CLUB - Ingrid Ricci, President

From Oct 2018 thru Oct 2019 our 53-member club contributed 187.5 hrs. of community. Collaborated with Citrus County Adopt-A Hwy Program by maintaining Spring Brook Rd. in Homosassa; weeding the landscape beds at the Homosassa Public Library; gardening of historic Stage Stand Cemetery; donated \$68 to Penny Pines; 500 native plant saplings to the community; \$52.00 to the City of Inverness community garden; \$3,000 in scholarships, sent 2 to Wekiva and 1 to SEEK.

Blue Star Marker - Since installation on April 1, 2017, at the historic Stage Stand cemetery, the landscape island has been improved by a group of dedicated volunteers led by Sandy Teubel. This was made possible by a \$1,000 club donation; donations by club members Mim Brocket, Gloria Petersen and Pattie Steck. Additionally, Citrus County provided mulch and Wilder Funeral Home contributed \$300 to the beautification project. This cooperative effort is an outstanding success story.

Club Meetings, Educational Programs & Field Trips: Horticultural education/exchange; Floral design presentations; Bird info/education; Mentored new members; Landscaping; Fire Prevention; Composting; Native Plants; Photo Composition by nature photographer Joe Dube; and a presentation on What the EPA Does.

It has been 38 yrs. since this club was established by a group of creative women. Since it has flourished into a diversified, creative and energetic club with great ideas for continued growth and continued legacy of protecting the environment and giving back to the community. This past year we contributed 187.5 hrs. of community service and 76% of our budget went back to the community.

- *In December, a monetary gift is collected and given to Blessed Hope, the local food bank.

The 6th fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that We pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The 7th fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and our flag against all her enemies, whether they are found within or without the boundaries of our republic.

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he too, has given his sons and daughters for defense of our country since they were first born.

The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrews eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christians eyes, God the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit.

The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding us of our nation's motto, "In God We Trust."

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for us the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today.
