# 2025 Fall Horticultural Expo Wrap Up

#### From Small Beginnings to a Community Tradition

The 2025 Fall Horticultural Expo and Plant Market brought together gardening enthusiasts, environmental organizations, families, and community members for a full day of discovery, shopping, and hands-on learning. What began as a modest plant sale in 2023 has quickly grown into one of the region's most anticipated horticultural events. Expo 2025 drew 1,900 visitors compared to 1,400 in 2024.

#### How to Grow an Expo

Gainesville Garden Club treasurer Kathy Stephens, who is also a Master Gardener, and Dr. Nazario-Leary (Environmental Horticulture & Master Gardener Volunteer (MGV) Coordinator) combined the strengths of both organizations to create a successful event. An event of this scale required careful planning and a lot of teamwork. The Steering Committee appreciates the countless hours that GGC members gave over the past 10 months. On event day, it was truly "all hands-on deck," with about 170 volunteers ensuring everything ran smoothly. 45 GGC members set up on Friday and 75 volunteered on Saturday. Plus, many members prepared for the Expo in advance but were unable to attend.

#### **A Mission with Roots**

The Plant Market visitors found fall-blooming plants, vegetable starts for the cooler season, perennial shrubs and trees, wildflower seeds, and pollinator pots. Leah Oehmig assisted Kathy Stephens with the 30 vendors from recruiting to loading out the arena. Steve Provost and Jill Carter marked booth spaces. Suzanne Rowett organized our gear.

The Expo isn't just about plants—it's about education, community engagement, and inspiring people to connect with the natural world. It is built on partnerships with dozens of organizations that Fran Marris Organized. Civic groups, Audubon Society, Girl Scouts, GrowHub and multiple state and county park systems all played a part.

#### **Speakers and Demonstrations**

Education is at the heart of the Expo and theme "Where the Wild Things Grow." Keynote speaker Jennifer Jewell of Cultivating Place presented "Sow Wild Wonder". She highlighted the impact of gardeners on our culture with "Big G" Gardening.

Kathy Post organized five demonstrations including GGC's Bruce Cavey's Capture Wildness in a Vase. Each circle displayed a fall floral tablescape organized by Donna Berthold. Gardenia Circle presented Fun with Flowers for adults and added a very popular FwF for Kids. Jasmine Circle staffed the bird house decorating and other booths and parked cars. Begonia Circle led the Kids Zone and She Shed. Becky O'Brien coordinated the speaker's talks and book sales. Karen Beaty headed up t-shirt and apron sales. Mona Rippe trained and supervised cashiers.

#### **Spreading the Word**

The Publicity team included Paula Waterman, Mary Birch-Hanson, Cat Parsons, Savannah Johnson and Gerardo Medrano. Kristy Welch designed the webpage and arena decorations. #### ROADSIDE CLEANUP

We have our first Roadside (2025-2026) cleanup scheduled for Saturday, November 15 from 9am-11am or noon. We are working with the State of Florida DOT to conduct litter removal on a portion of 13<sup>th</sup> Street from Archer Road (South) to 16<sup>th</sup> Street (GHS) (North).

The roadside cleanup will be done in pairs, and Karen Beaty has openings for **eight more** volunteers (first comefirst served). She has all the supplies that we will need including vests, trash bags, signs, carts, pickers and water. However, she will need a volunteer count by this Thursday.



We will review the procedures for litter bag collection at the Adopt-A-Highway Signs (at Archer Road and at GHS) Karen has a volunteer who will coordinate this with all walkers. Star Automotive at 706 NW 13<sup>th</sup> Street has agreed to let us use their property as a staging and parking area (just don't park in front of dumpsters).

Please contact Karen if you are able to help. Karen needs all volunteers to review a short DOT safety video before the actual cleanup. Karen will send this info to each volunteer once she has your name. Our designated area is only 2 miles, on both sides of 13<sup>th</sup> Street, so if we have 16 volunteers, the faster we get done.

Hope you can volunteer and if not this time, then sometime in 2026.

#### WILDFLOWER AREA

In the fall of 2022 native wildflowers were sown on the GGC grounds in an area surrounding the stump of a large oak tree that had to be removed following heavy storm damage. Since then, the area has gone through various stages. In June of 2023, Coreopsis leavenworthii dominated.



However, in May 2025 black eyed Susans (Rudbeckia hirta) put on a fantastic show, blooming by the hundreds, for months. (It was a dry spring and black-eyed Susans thrive in dryer conditions.) - Lois McNamara

#### FIELD TRIP TO THE SANTA FE COLLEGE TEACHING ZOO


Seventeen Mimosa Circle went on a guided tour of the zoo on October 23. We learned that the Santa Fe College Teaching Zoo, a unique 10-acre zoo in Gainesville, Florida, is the only zoo on a college campus accredited by the

Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA).


The SF Teaching Zoo is coordinated by ten full time staff members, home to over 70 different species of animals and is maintained by about 100 students enrolled in the college's premier Zoo Animal Technology program.







The zoo showcases a diverse collection that contains both native and exotic species for everyone to enjoy. Visitors enjoy the Bald Eagles, White-throated capuchin monkeys, American alligators and Matschie's Tree Kangaroo to name a few. These species and many other mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians are on display in a naturally shaded environment. The 1/4 mile trail through the wooded environment is lined with mulch and is stroller and/or wheelchair accessible.



Magnolia flowers are among the oldest flowering plants on Earth, dating back nearly 95 million years-long before bees existed. Instead of bees, magnolias evolved to be pollinated by beetles, which were among the earliest available pollinators. Their thick, waxy petals protect against damage from beetles' chewing mouthparts, allowing successful pollination. This ancient plant-pollinator

#### **Board of Trustees** – Kathy Powell Terry Murphy

The BOT met on October 9, 2025. Old business included review of two e mail votes over the summer: 1) \$6000 additional approved for completion of the bathroom project and 2) \$1300 approved to replace the large planters.

#### **MOTIONS**

Kathy Powell, BOT, presented the following recommendations as an eVote.

# The Hermit Thrush

# They're here for the winter!

It turns out I've got something in common with the Hermit Thrush. They too avoid snow and harsh cold. And like me, they choose to spend winter away from it! According to Cornell Lab of Ornithology's "Birds of the World" website, in winter they are "common only in forests with average January temperatures > -1°C (30.2°F) and no snow."

And it's likely most of those we enjoy in our area are males as the male winter population centers along a line roughly between Savannah, GA through Jackson MS while the center of the female population is a degree or so farther north; roughly along a line from Augusta, GA to Birmingham, AL. That doesn't mean they're all males here or all females north of that line, only that the ratio of males to

for the very lucky the Gray-cheeked Thrush) may be seen during migration. But this one's pretty easy to distinguish. The eyering is thin but complete and white on the Hermit Thrush, the tail is distinctly reddish, and they flick that tail more than any of those others.

On their breeding grounds nearly all their diet consists of small non-vertebrates, mostly insects but also anything else they happen to catch. In Spring and Summer such animal prey makes up more than 90% of the diet, but in winter it may account for less than half the diet When prey is scarce, they supplement with fruits and berries, such as the Dahoon Holly th bird on the left is consuming. So when it's colc watch for them where such vegetable foods an found. And you can learn more about the Hermit Thrush here!

#### TRIVIA ANSWERS

- 1. You might be surprised to learn that <u>bats</u>, <u>birds</u>, <u>butterflies</u>, and <u>some beetles are also pollinators</u>. In fact, even some larger animals (such as black and white ruffed lemurs) and reptiles (such as lizards) are <u>critical pollinators</u>.
- 2. No. Native bees occur on every single continent except Antarctica.
- 3. **Answer:** C, **55,000.** It takes eight bees their entire lifetime to make 1 teaspoon of honey. But because of its numbers, the average hive makes 60 pounds of honey in a good season.


